RESIDENTIAL BUILDING GARAGE FIRES



In the past, Grand Chute Fire Department has responded to several residential fires that have started in the garage. There have been many different ignition sources ranging from fuels, grass clippings and improper disposal of fireworks. We can all do our part to minimize becoming part of the national statistics. There are many ways to prevent losses by being aware of our surroundings as well as keeping proper housekeeping. If there would be any questions, feel free to contact us.

Fires originating in residential building garages tend to be larger and spread farther than fires that start in other areas of a residence.¹

An estimated 6,600 residential building fires that originated in attached garages were reported by U.S. fire departments annually from 2009 to 2011. These fires caused an estimated 30 deaths, 400 injuries and \$457 million in property damage. Residential building garage fires accounted for about 2% of all residential building fires reported to the National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS), and we are not the exception.

Many garages are initially designated for the use of vehicle storage; however, many garages are used for storage or converted to living spaces, such as bedrooms and dens. When garages are converted for use as occupied spaces, they may often not have alarms or heat sensors installed.

Few, if any, building codes require smoke alarms in residential garages. Detection of fire in a garage takes longer due to the absence of automatic detection; this delay gives a fire time to grow, ultimately causing more damage.

The contents of garages and the type of construction may also contribute to greater damage and present challenges and threats to our firefighters.

We thank everyone for supporting and helping the Grand Chute Fire Department by following fire safety measures when at home. By working together, we make this a great community to be a part of.

The U.S. Fire Administration reminds residents to follow these prevention tips to keep homes safe from garage fires.

Keep garages clean and clear, free of oil and grease buildup. Move flammables away from heat sources. Store oil, gasoline, paints, propane and varnishes in a shed away from your home.

Keep items that can burn on shelves away from appliances. Plug only one charging appliance into an outlet.

Do not use extension cords to charge an appliance.

Other Safety Tidbits:

Do not leave your vehicle running unattended (carbon monoxide poisoning is a silent killer)

Keep an ABC dry chemical fire extinguisher on sight in the garage.

ALWAYS CALL THE FIRE DEPARTMENT (911) FOR ANY FIRE, even if it has been extinguished (there are no small fires)

Accepting the Challenge

The Grand Chute Fire Explorer Program is a Baylakes Council "Learning for Life" program supported by the Grand Chute Fire Department. In the Explorer Program, young adults between the ages of 15 and 21 are taught many skills needed to become a firefighter as well as emergency medical service skills.

On Saturday May 31, 2014, four members of the explorers group traveled to Northshore Fire Department in Glendale, Wisconsin to participate in an agility challenge. This is an annual event that has been growing over the last ten years and now has twelve teams competing with a total of seventy participants. During this challenge, explorers perform firefighter tasks in the following order: Carry a high rise pack (100' of 1 3/4" hose) up three flights of stairs; hoist a 50'

section of 2 1/2" hose to the third story; use a Keiser sled to move a 160# beam five feet (this station simulates forcible entry/chopping); drag a 3" hoseline 150'; and finally drag a 180# dummy 100'. Each participant is timed during this challenge with the best times awarded plaques and trophies.

The Grand Chute Fire Explorers team consisting of Travis Busch, Blake Ebben, Bill Hackett, and Joe Kraft won Third Place in the overall team event. CONGRATULATIONS GUYS!!!! SUMMER CONSTRUCTION OR HOME IMPROVEMENT PLANS?

As summer projects are upon us, residents are reminded to contact the Building Inspection Department prior to making improvements to their home or property. In addition to new construction, additions, and general remodeling, a Building Permit is required for such things as siding, roofing, decks, sunrooms, swimming pools, storage sheds, garages, and fences.

Work completed under a Building Permit ensures that inspection services are provided to safeguard life, health, public welfare, and property values. Through the permit process, Town staff will inspect construction work and installations to ensure that they are done safely and in accordance with current requirements. Regular inspections during construction not only can reveal minor problems that could avert costly repairs in the future, but may also identify life-safety concerns needing immediate correction.

Submitting a permit application and all other required information about your project in advance of when you wish to begin work will help to ensure a timely review and permit issuance. If you are unsure whether your project requires a permit, or if you have other questions, please contact a Building Inspector at 920-832-1599. NEW OFFICERS

You may notice several new faces in Grand Chute Police Department uniforms. We are pleased to welcome seven new police officers to our team over the last year.

Officer Ted Vandenberg is originally from Little Chute. He graduated from the Criminal Justice program at Carroll University and attended the Law Enforcement Recruit Academy at NWTC. He became a Grand Chute Police Officer in late April of 2013.

Officer Mark Maas earned a Criminal Justice degree from UW-Platteville and attended the Law Enforcement Recruit Academy at FVTC. Officer Maas also joined our team in late April of 2013.

Officer Joe Teigen became a Grand Chute Police Officer in July 2013. GRAND CHUTE PARKS

Art Lecker Park at the north end of Gillett Street was opened last winter for cross country skiing and snow shoeing. Two kilometers of groomed ski trails were offered to area skiers. The trails consisted of a single track for traditional skiing and an adjacent skate skiing lane. This summer, the Town is working with ski park designer Gary Larson of Duluth, MN, to create an additional 2K of trails through the wooded areas of the park. With Gary Larson's design and the assistance of the Fox Valley Technical College Forestry program, the wooded trail routes will be prepared for use as winter ski trails. In addition to the new layout for skiing, approximately 2K of trails will be open in the warm weather months for walking and hiking. Watch the Town's web site for volunteer needs to get this new facility up and running.



Arrowhead Park on Aster Lane has a boardwalk that connects the park to Spencer Street on the north and to Natures Lane on the west. In the 15 years since the original boardwalk was constructed, the support posts have heaved out of the ground from a height of 18 inches to over 5 feet in some locations. This spring, the Town hired the Wisconsin Conservation Corps to rebuild the boardwalk to its original elevation and create a level walking surface. The group of five to seven men have been working for five weeks on the reconstruction of the boardwalk. The result was a boardwalk that reopened on June 6th. The new boardwalk has a floating support system on the surrounding wetlands and will again provide a safe connection from Arrowhead Park to the surrounding subdivisions.



The Public Works Department recently took

delivery of two specialized pieces of equipment to assist in our general maintenance work and emergency operations. The first new piece of equipment is a grapple attachment for the excavator. A similar machine with this attachment was rented for clean-up after last year's tornados. We saw other uses for this attachment such as drainage way cleaning and materials handling. This tool will make jobs with heavy lifting and holding much more efficient.

The next new piece of equipment is a new construction sweeper. This sweeper is a replacement of a 1989 model that has become uneconomical to maintain. The construction sweeper is used in multiple departments for cleanup of hard surface areas such as streets, trails or parking lots. Spring cleanup of the streets is done with this sweeper prior to the contracted vacuum sweeper. Road debris is swept to the sides so the contracted sweeper can vacuum the debris in a single pass.

BICYCLE AND PEDESTRIAN SAFETY




Finally, old man winter is gone and good weather is upon us. That means it's time to dust off the bikes and get the walking shoes on. Before you head out the door, let's take a moment and review some safety tips:

Bicycle Safety

Before taking the bicycle out, be sure to know your ABCs of bicycle maintenance—AIR, BRAKES, and CHAIN. Check the AIR in both tires. If you are unsure how much air should be inflated, check on the side of the tire. It will show you numbers for minimum and maximum PSI. Having proper inflation will likely prevent flat tires. Check the BRAKES. The goal here is to make sure the brakes are functioning properly. Squeeze the breaks and make sure the pads hit the rims evenly. Then, check the CHAIN to make sure it is properly lubricated. This will help the chain last longer, and most of the time, provide a smooth, quiet ride.

Now that your bike has been inspected, be sure you have personal safety equipment. Most importantly, make sure you have a bicycle helmet that is the right size and adjusted properly. This will provide better comfort and more protection.


Know where to ride your bicycle. Did you know when riding the bicycle you should ride with the flow of traffic and obey all of the same traffic laws as if you were driving a vehicle? When turning, it is a good practice to use hand signals. This helps other motorists know exactly what your intentions are. It's suggested you wear bright clothing to be more visible to motorists. Also, when riding at dusk, dawn, or at night, be sure you have a working bicycle light in the front and one in the back. It's the law and the lights make you more visible to motorists.



Pedestrian Safety

Walking, although enjoyable and relaxing, can also be dangerous if you are not careful. Unlike a bicycle, you walk in the direction of oncoming traffic. This allows you and the motorist to see each other. Walk on the sidewalk whenever possible. When coming to a road with traffic standards, obey the indicator telling you stop (often indicated by a red hand) or walk (indicated by the words WALK - in white lettering). Walk within crosswalks and, before entering the roadway, be sure to look both ways.

Make safety part of your daily routine. Your family is counting on you to be safe and return home after your bike rides and walks. Enjoy the weather and be safe by following these safety tips from the Grand Chute Police Department.




Wear the helmet flat on the head, not tilted back at an angle!



Make sure the helmet fits snugly and does not obstruct the field of vision. Make sure the chin strap fits securely and that the buckle stays fastened.

TEXT YOUR TIPS TO GRAND CHUTE POLICE ~ TIP411



Do you have information on a crime or suspicious issue, but are concerned if you share the information, you will be identified in the case? Do you prefer to text non-emergency tips/information to the police rather than call or have them come to your house? Grand Chute Police have the answer—Tip411. Tip411 is an internet-based tool that enables the public to text anonymous tips to police. The police can then respond back using a unique identifier, creating a two-way anonymous “chat.”

With this system, citizens can continue playing an active role in keeping the neighborhoods safe with limited fear of identification or retaliation. Several tips, ranging from possible drug complaints to reckless driving incidents have been texted to our office over the last year. Since the system allows police to communicate directly with the anonymous tipster, additional information or updates can be shared as necessary.

Text tips from your cell phone, computer, tablet, or other web-enabled device.

Cell Phone: Send an anonymous tip to the Grand Chute Police Department by texting the keyword **TIPGCPD**, followed by the tip information to **847411 (tip411)**.

Computer, tablet, or other web-enabled device: Submit an anonymous tip by following the

It is 100% anonymous. Citizen Observer’s technology removes all identifying information before the Police Department sees it.

PUBLIC EDUCATION WITH THE GRAND CHUTE FIRE DEPARTMENT



The Town of Grand Chute Fire Department is committed to providing the public with education not only in fire prevention and safety, but also in the medical/health field. Besides first aid tips and reminders, we offer “life-saving” Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) training, and certification based on the American Heart Association guidelines. This training is video based with practical hands-on practice and hands-on certification. This training is offered for a small fee at the Town of Grand Chute Fire Station 1 or at local businesses in our Town.

We offer fire extinguisher training both in-house and at the work place using our new Bullex training simulator that is capable of extinguishing simulated fire with remote electronic extinguishers and also water extinguishers. This training is offered for a small fee that is determined by the size of the class.

During the year, public education is conducted in local businesses, schools, and daycare centers located in the Town for children of all age levels. During these presentations, various topics are discussed including the fire prevention theme for the year along with routine programs for various grade levels. If the fire truck is available, the on-duty company will offer fire truck tours and the chance to sit inside the fire truck.

Station tours are also available by appointment and can be set up by contacting Assistant Chief Richard Trilling at (920) 832-6050 ext. 6002. During the tours, groups will learn about the Town of Grand Chute Fire Department, how it operates, receive a full-station tour, an upclose view of our fire trucks including the tools and gear that firefighters use on a daily basis. All well-behaved participants receive a “goody bag” to help them remember the experience.

GRASS CLIPPINGS



Grass clippings contain a large amount of phosphorus, the nutrient that turns lakes green with algae. Please do not sweep or blow your grass clippings into the street because they are washed into the storm sewer and ultimately end up in our streams, rivers and lakes. One bushel of grass clippings can produce up to 50 pounds of algae! Storm water utilities are spending large amounts of money to meet the sediment and nutrient restrictions from the State and Federal governments. Each resident needs to do their part to help lower our

discharge of sediment and phosphorous. By working together, we can keep our lakes and waterways clear and manage the increases to our storm water rates. Grass clippings can be left on your



lawn, added to a compost pile or dropped off at one of the yard waste sites in the City of Appleton.

NEW WATER METERS



Later this summer, the Water Utility will be sending our employees into residential neighborhoods to change-out water meters. Over the next four years, all the water meters in the Town must be changed to be compatible with the new AMI meter reading system. Neighborhoods will be notified in advance that Town personnel will be in the area to change meters. The change-out typically takes about 30 minutes if there are no problems. If you are not home, utility staff will leave a card notifying you to contact the Town to schedule an appointment. Your cooperation with this process will help the utility stay on track to complete this process.

***Overflow Garbage Week July 28 – Aug 1***

Place your extra garbage (that does not fit into your container) by the curb or roadside at least 5 feet away from any automated container, **on your garbage day by 6 a.m.** with

your normal refuse. A separate truck will follow to pick up the overflow garbage during your garbage day or possibly the next day. Please note that overflow garbage does not include appliances, TV's, building materials, or any hazardous materials. The final overflow garbage week will be in October.

CURBSIDE BRUSH CHIPPING



Increased workloads for the Public Works personnel have necessitated the reduction in the curbside brush chipping schedule. This season's schedule has been modified by eliminating all curbside chipping during the month of July. The chipping volumes have increased to the point that the chipping crew is out two to three days every week to clean up the brush piles that are put out by Town residents. These lost days limit the time for

maintenance of the Town's roadway, utility and storm water infrastructure. Chipping will resume on its regular schedule during the months of August, September and October. The chipping volume limitation of 480 cubic feet will remain in effect when chipping service resumes. Brush drop-off sites in the City of Appleton are available throughout the year for any Town resident. Check the Appleton web site for hours of operation.

WATER LEAK DETECTION SURVEY



The Town of Grand Chute Water Department is in the process of an ongoing leak survey. This survey will help us locate and repair leaks in the Town's water system. As part of this survey, all water valves must be located and exposed. If you see Town employees in your yard with flags or paint, we are locating

your water service valve. The purpose of the survey is to find water that is being lost and not sold. All of the Town's water is purchased from the City of Appleton. Water that is lost and not sold has a direct impact on the water rates that customers are charged. Finding leaks helps the utility control future rate increases.

SANITARY SEWER CLEANING

Sanitary sewer cleaning is part of an ongoing program to keep the sewer system flowing and prevent back-ups. This cleaning process involves jetting the sewer mains with high pressure water. The pressure generated from the jetting can cause toilets to erupt or overflow. This is an uncommon occurrence but does happen in some situations. Keeping the toilet lid down can minimize any water that may overflow out of the toilet.
