IMPORTANT - WHEEL TAX ALERT!

Although the Town of Grand Chute has not discussed implementing a local wheel tax, you may end up paying one anyway! If you mistakenly have your vehicle registered as residing in the City of Appleton versus the Town of Grand Chute you would be billed if the City of Appleton adopts a wheel tax. This tax would be collected at the time of your annual vehicle registration renewal process and could be as much as \$20 per vehicle. We estimate based on figures provided by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation that two-thirds of the vehicles owned by residents in Grand Chute are mistakenly registered as vehicles that reside within the City of Appleton.

Here is what you need to do as soon as possible. When sent your annual notice for vehicle registration, check to see that the vehicle is registered in Grand Chute and not the City of Appleton. You can go on the DOT website immediately at www.dot.wisconsin.gov/drivers/change.htm and update your mailing address as well to correct future mailings going forward. If you ultimately ended

up paying a wheel tax inadvertently to the City of Appleton, your final recourse would be to request a refund of the wheel tax from the State of Wisconsin which they state they will honor and process. At the time of publication, the City of Appleton is still debating implementing a wheel tax. It is important for all Grand Chute residents to list their mailing address as Grand Chute and not Appleton. The post office recognizes Grand Chute as a mailing address and will send your mail to the correct address. Who knows what future types of grants or aids will be provided to local municipalities based on a funding formula using an inaccurate address database collected by the State. We want every citizen to count and be recognized as living in Grand Chute! If you have any questions in regards to this matter, please get informed. ELECTION UPDATES

New Election Bills Passed

In April 2014, several bills were enacted by the State Legislature and signed into law by the Governor relating to elections, campaign finance, lobbying, and public records law. Some of the newly-enacted election laws pertain to activities at the polling location, while others pertain to the electorate.

Senate Bill 324 limits the times for in-person absentee voting to be between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. (Note: Town Hall is open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday for voting, except the last Friday before the election, Town Hall is open until 5:00 p.m.) In-person absentee voting is now prohibited on weekends and holidays.

Senate Bill 20 allows for election inspectors serving at the polling location to be an elector of the county; previously, election inspectors were required to be a resident of the municipality. Chief Inspectors are still required to be residents of the municipality. If anyone living in Outagamie County is interested in becoming an election inspector in Grand Chute, I encourage them to complete the Election Inspector Application found on our website www.grandchute.net under Find a Form/Permit or visit the Clerk's Office at Town Hall.

Upcoming General Election

The General Election will be held on November 4, 2014. All polling locations are open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Important dates regarding this upcoming election are as follows:

1) October 15th is the last day to register by mail.

2) October 16 - October 31 voters may register in the Clerk's Office.

Note: Whether registering by mail or in person, you are required to provide a document showing proof of residency. Refer to www.grandchute.net for examples of proof of residency documents or on page two of the Voter Registration Application.

3) October 20 - October 31 electors may vote absentee in the Clerk's Office. (Absentee voting will take place in the Board Room at Town Hall.)

Spring Primary Election

The Spring Primary Election held the third week in February, typically has low voter turnout. For the past two years, the Town Board has combined Wards 1-18, making Town Hall the single polling location in Town. This past February, a total of 1,200 electors voted in person and 367 absentee ballots were processed. Over the past two years, the Town has saved over \$20,000 in election related expenses by combining wards for the Spring Primary Election. I will be presenting a resolution to combine wards once again for the 2015 Spring Primary Election. Notifications of any change to your polling location is posted well in advance at each regular polling location, Woodman's Grocery, Copp's Foods, Fire Station #1, Town Hall, and the Town's website at www.grandchute.net. In addition, a press release is sent to local media.

Polling Location Change for Wards 8, 9, 10, 11

Wards 8, 9, 10, and 11 will vote at Fire

Station #2 on Highview Drive for the last time on November 4th. **Due to the construction of a new Fire Substation #2 on Glenridge Court and Spencer Street, the station on Highview Drive will no longer be utilized for voting after November 4th.** The new polling location for Wards 8, 9, and 10 will be Appleton Alliance Church, 2693 W. Grand Chute Boulevard, and the polling location for Ward 11 will be Globe University, 5045 W. Grande Market Drive. All registered electors in these wards will be notified by mail of their polling location change.

My Vote Wisconsin Website

I encourage you to visit the Government Accountability Board's website called *My Vote Wisconsin* (myvote.wi.gov). This site provides electors the opportunity to register online, to view their personal voting information including registration status (are you active or inactive); polling place location, municipal clerk information, voting history, absentee or provisional ballot status; and allows you to view a sample ballot for an upcoming election (sample ballots can be viewed 20 days prior to an upcoming election).

It is important to note if you have moved, recently changed your name, or are a new resident of Wisconsin, you will need to register or re-register. You may do so online at myvote.wi.gov, in the Clerk's office, or at your polling location on Election Day. Remember you must provide proof of residency that has your new address or new name included on the document.

HYDRANT FLUSHING



Starting September 15th between the hours of 7:30 and 4:30 our crews will be flushing the main water distribution lines through the fire hydrants. You may detect a slight bit of discoloration and a small amount of mineral deposits in your water system. By using your cold water fixtures at more frequent intervals, this problem should be corrected sooner. Although the water may appear to have a somewhat bad characteristic, it is completely harmless. The program must be performed to supply you with better quality drinking water. Thank you for your cooperation.

SANITARY SEWER CLEANING 

Sanitary sewer cleaning is part of an ongoing program to keep the sewer system flowing and prevent back-ups. This cleaning process involves jetting the sewer mains with high pressure water. The pressure generated from the jetting can cause toilets to erupt or overflow. This is an uncommon occurrence but does happen in

some situations. Keeping the toilet lid down can minimize any water that may overflow out of the toilet.



WATER LEAK DETECTION SURVEY 



The Town of Grand Chute Water Department is in the process of an ongoing water leak survey. This survey will help us locate and repair leaks in the Town's water system. As part of this survey, all water valves must be located and exposed. If you see Town employees in your yard with flags or

paint, we are locating your water service valve. The purpose of the survey is to find water that is being lost and not sold. All of the Town's water is purchased from the City of Appleton. Water that is lost and not sold has a direct impact on the water rates that customers are charged. Finding leaks helps the utility control future rate increases.

Winter Parking and Snow Removal



It is hard to believe November 2014 is just around the corner. The days will be getting shorter, the nights longer, and winds more blustery. Yes, soon it will be winter. I would like to take this opportunity to remind you of three Grand Chute town ordinances that address winter snow removal.

Town Ordinance 515-4 C. All-Night Parking Regulated, “When signs have been erected at or reasonably near the corporate limits of the Town, no person shall park any motor vehicle on any street or road in the Town of Grand Chute for a period longer than 30 minutes between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. from November 1 of each year to April 1 of the following year.”

The fine for violating the winter parking ordinance is \$20. The police department understands when a personal conflict may prevent the removal of a vehicle parked on the street overnight. In the event such a circumstance occurs, please call the police department at (920) 832-1575 to make a request for overnight parking on town streets. We will try to honor your request; however, the daily weather forecast will be the main factor in deciding to grant permission for your vehicle to be parked on the street. If you call the police department after normal

business hours, your call will be answered by the Outagamie County Dispatch Center. When you call, please state the reason for your call and request to speak to a Grand Chute officer. Outagamie County dispatchers are not authorized to grant overnight parking in the Town of Grand Chute.

Town Ordinance 398-5 Depositing Of Snow On Public Right-Of-Ways, “No person shall remove or cause to be removed any snow or ice from a premises owned or occupied by that person or from any residence, parking lot, parking area, filling station, business property or other property owned or occupied by said person by placing said snow onto any public right-of-way or property. Snow removed from public walks shall not be stored in any manner which will obstruct or limit vehicular or pedestrian vision, movement, or access.”

This ordinance makes it illegal to push snow into or across the street when shoveling, blowing, or plowing out your driveway and sidewalks. It also restricts snow stored or piled in a way that obstructs or limits the vision of vehicular or pedestrian traffic. Any violation of this ordinance would be considered a nuisance. In addition to a \$124 - \$313 fine, dependent on prior violations, the Town of Grand Chute may summarily remove any snow or ice and charge the property owner for the removal.

Town Ordinance 515-4 D. Snow Emergencies, “Declaration of emergency. A snow emergency is in existence when the Chairperson or his designee declares an emergency to exist in the Town of Grand Chute by reason of an emergency snowstorm. Said emergency is declared to continue for a period of 48 hours after declaration or until such earlier time as snowplowing operations have been declared completed by the Director of Public Works.”

The Chairperson or his designee may declare a snow emergency through the press, radio, or other public means of communication. When a snow emergency has been declared, no person shall park any vehicle on any street, alley, or public parking lot during the period of a snow emergency, or immediately thereafter, until such street, alley, or public parking lot has been cleared of snow. During declared snow emergencies, any vehicle which impedes expeditious snow removal efforts will be ticketed and towed at the owner’s expense.

Every year, the Grand Chute Street Department works hard to keep your town streets clear of snow and ice. Please do your part to follow the winter snow removal ordinances and remember to also keep fire hydrants clear from snow and ice. Have a safe winter driving season.

School is Back In Session

As the new school begins, we reflect on the fading summer. We try to anticipate how this year will go and we prepare all the school supplies and clothes our children will need. Some parents will feel a sense of happiness their children are engaging in another year of learning while other parents will feel sad their “baby boy” or “baby girl” is growing up and is off to school for their very first year.

Regardless of age, all parents should be mindful of dangers our children face on a daily basis and how to combat those dangers, simply by conversing with your children. We, at the Grand Chute Police Department, would like to share some guidance on how parents can do just that.

Safety is our number one priority. Getting to school safely, being safe while there, and returning home safely at the end of the day are vital.

Children travel to and from school in a variety of ways. Whether walking, riding the bus, biking, or getting a ride from family or friends, talk with your children about the safest routes to and from school. Encourage them to walk in groups and be aware of their surroundings.

If your child is approached by a stranger, would they know how to react? Talk to your children about the importance of not speaking to strangers and telling a trusted adult immediately if they feel uneasy, frightened or simply unsure.

Bullying is not tolerated at our schools. *(Continued on page 7)*

(Continued from page 6) If your child feels they are being bullied, or if they witness another child being bullied, encourage them to speak with their teachers, Police School Liaison Officer, guidance counselor or another trusted adult. With awareness comes enforcement, and ultimately, compliance to the rules.

Lastly, make sure your children know emergency contacts, phone numbers and their home address. If your child is too young to remember this, make sure they have a way to reference the contact information, such as on a label inside their book bag or on a note in their cell phone.

Share the Road with School Buses

School buses are one of the safest forms of transportation on the road today. Unfortunately, getting on and off the bus are not always so safe. For this reason, it is necessary to know the proper laws and procedures for safely sharing the road with school buses.

- If you see a school bus in your lane or coming towards you, pay close attention to kids waiting for the bus and be prepared to stop.
- School buses use yellow flashing lights to alert motorists they are preparing to stop to load or unload children.
- Red flashing signals and an extended stop sign arm signals to motorists that the bus is stopped and children are getting on or off the bus.
- Stop your car at least 20 feet from a school bus to allow children the necessary space to safely enter and exit the bus and cross the street.
- On an undivided roadway, all traffic from both directions must stop when the bus's red signals are flashing and the stop sign is extended.
- On a multi-lane divided roadway with no barrier, all traffic from both directions must stop when the bus's red signals are flashing and the stop sign is extended.
- On a divided roadway with a center median, all lanes of traffic must stop for the school bus, except the opposing lanes.
- A driver passing a school bus with red flashing signals and a stop sign extended can be cited when a school bus driver reports the violation to police.
- Violators can expect a \$250 fine for the first offense and 6 demerit points.

Bus transportation should be safe for children so remember, be alert, be patient, and obey all traffic laws whenever you are near a school bus. Do your part to keep our streets safe and protect tomorrow's leaders.

Bow Hunting in the Town

With deer bow hunting opening September 13th, everyone should be aware of changes to the State Statute pertaining to hunting restrictions imposed by local governments on hunting with a bow and arrow or crossbow, as well as, a change in the state hunting regulations allowing all hunters to now use a crossbow to hunt deer.

Wisconsin Act 71 was enacted December 12, 2013, which has a direct effect on the Town's Ordinance 415-3,

Discharge of firearms and other weapons; Hunting. Act 71 disallows a local government from enacting or adopting a restriction that prohibits a person from hunting with a bow and arrow or crossbow within the jurisdiction of that local governmental unit. So what does that mean? Prior to Act 71, the Town had a designated area where the discharge of any type of weapon was prohibited. This area was identified as "Exhibit A" on the Grand Chute hunting limits map. Anyone previously wishing to discharge a bow and arrow in this zone had to request permission from the Town to do so. All requests would be examined by the police department and either approved or denied. This will no longer happen since Act 71 prohibits the Town from enforcing the ordinance.

Act 71 also identifies the distance someone must be from a building when discharging a bow and arrow or crossbow as 100 yards. The Town's prior ordinance stated a person had to be 500 feet from a building. The ordinance has since been revised to read 100 yards, consistent with Act 71.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Board has approved the use of a crossbow for hunting deer by all licensed hunters. Prior to the rules change, the use of a crossbow was only allowed for hunters with disabilities. The crossbow season will run concurrently with the bow and arrow season.

As a reminder, although all areas of the Town are now open to hunting, hunters still must abide by all Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources rules governing bow and arrow and crossbow hunting. There are still areas in the Town that a person cannot discharge a bow and arrow or crossbow because they would be violating state regulations. Good luck and have a safe hunting season.

SMOKE ALARMS AND THEIR IMPORTANCE – WHY, WHERE, AND WHICH



A smoke alarm is critical for the early detection of a fire in your home and could mean the difference between life and death. Having a smoke alarm is the first key step towards your family's safety.

This information is not intended to be all inclusive, but it is intended to inform the reader about some of the safety aspects and importance of having and maintaining working smoke alarms.

This year Fire Prevention Week is October 5th – 11th and the topic is **“Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives – Test Yours Every Month”**

Why?

Every year in the United States, about 3,000 people lose their lives in residential fires. One of the main reasons fire victims die from smoke and toxic gases is due to inhalation and not from burns; smoke travels farther and faster than flames. A majority of fires occur when families are asleep and they are not aware of the danger until there is insufficient time to escape. A smoke alarm acts like a sentinel around the clock and, when it first senses smoke, it sounds a high-pitched audible alarm. This often allows precious but limited time to escape.

About two-thirds of fatalities occur in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms. Properly installed and maintained smoke alarms are considered to be one of the best and least expensive means of providing an early warning of a potentially deadly fire and could reduce the risk of dying from a fire in your home by almost half.

Where?

Smoke alarms should be

installed on every level of the home, outside sleeping areas, and inside bedrooms

They should be installed and maintained according to the manufacturer's instructions. When installing them, many factors determine where and how many you need to install.

In general, you should place alarms in the center of a ceiling or, if you place them on a wall, they should be 6 to 12 inches below the ceiling.

Which is Better?

Although there are several choices to make in selecting the right smoke alarms to buy, the most vital thing to consider is that they save lives. For that reason, the Grand Chute Fire Department recommends installing at least one smoke alarm per level in your home.

Smoke alarms may contain different or multiple sensors

There are two main types of smoke alarms, which are categorized by the type of smoke detection sensor, **ionization and photoelectric**, used in the alarm. A smoke alarm uses one or both methods, sometimes with a heat detector, to warn of a fire.

Ionization detectors are best for:

- **Flaming/fast burning fires** result from the ignition of items such as flammable liquids, wood or paper, or open flames, such as candles that ignite other items. These fires produce large quantities of flames and lesser amounts of smoke

Photoelectric detectors are best for:

- **Smoldering fires** most often occur when smoking materials, such as cigarettes, are left unattended. These

fires produce minimal amounts of flames, but large quantities of smoke.

- National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS) data shows that **93 percent of all residential fires are flaming and that flaming fires account for 75 percent of residential fire deaths**. Together, both types of residential fires claim about 2,650 lives annually (NFPA).

During the last year, the Grand Chute Fire Department was awarded with a grant to provide smoke alarms to its residents and educate them about their use. Grand Chute Fire Department installed **285** smoke alarms in Grand Chute residences. We can all do our part to minimize becoming part of the national statistics. A key way to prevent a loss of life is installing smoke alarms, testing them monthly and changing the batteries at least twice a year.

D/C Kasriel has spent the last 17 months as the Training Lieutenant for the City of Golden, Colorado Fire Department and previously as a Lieutenant with the Garden City, Kansas Fire Department. He has also spent time with the University Of Kansas Fire & Rescue Training Institute as an associate instructor. He holds a Bachelor's Degree from Oklahoma State University and has also recently completed his Master's Degree from Grand Canyon University. D/C Kasriel has extensive training in various areas of the fire service including Instructor, Fire Officer, and Special Operations. His civic involvement is also quite extensive including the achievement of Eagle Scout, Big Brothers Big Sisters, various technical committees and member of several national organizations including NFPA, IFSTA and the Society of Fire Protection Engineers.



GRAND CHUTE FIRE DEPARTMENT BECOMES EMT-BASIC NON-TRANSPORT

Grand Chute Fire Department has upgraded their medical license level from Emergency Medical Responder (EMR) to Emergency Medical Technician – Basic (EMT-B) non-transport as of August 1, 2014. This upgrade increased our personnel's education and knowledge base which will allow us to provide a higher level of care to our citizens and visitors.

We are excited about this upgrade considering that in 2013 we responded to 1266 emergency medical calls. This indicates that over 70% of our total calls were requests for emergency medical service last year. With these statistics on the rise, we feel this is a

move in the right direction to better serve our community.

We continue to utilize the skills and equipment that we have been using as EMRs, the upgrade in skill level now allows us to administer medication for additional medical issues that we routinely come across. When dealing with cardiac emergencies, we can now administer aspirin and assist with the patient's nitroglycerin. During respiratory emergencies we are able to administer albuterol and atrovent and able to use continuous positive airway pressure (CPAP). Administering glucagon for diabetic emergencies is another medication added through this

process. Laryngoscope and Magill Forceps are tools that assist with removing an airway obstruction and these are two pieces of equipment that have been added also.

As of September 1, 2014 we added the ability to administer Naloxone (Narcan). This is the life-saving drug that is used during a drug overdose of an opioid. There are legal (prescribed pain medication) and illegal (heroin) opioids that are used (those are just two examples.) We have opted to administer this drug via intranasal.

PREPARATION FOR WINTER ALSO INVOLVES FIRE SAFETY

As the season is "Fall-ing" upon us, winter is close at hand and the Grand Chute Fire Department encourages everyone to think about fire and life safety in and around their homes.

With cooler temperatures, people are preparing to turn on their furnaces and other heating devices.

- * Always make sure that your furnace is serviced on a regular basis by a qualified technician.
- * Keep clutter away from furnaces, water heaters, water shut-offs and electrical panels.
- * Do not use space heaters if possible and if used, NEVER leave them on unattended.
- * Keep vent/exhaust pipes clear of snow and ice build up on the exterior of your home.
- * If you have a fireplace, only burn clean, dry wood and make sure that your chimney gets cleaned professionally on an annual basis.
- * If you have any gas powered appliances in your home including furnaces, stoves, water heaters, clothes dryers, fire places, etc., make sure that you have carbon monoxide detectors in your home.

Other important reminders during the holiday season:

- Please remember to keep fire hydrants in your neighborhoods shoveled out on a regular basis
- Make sure that your address numbers do not match their background and are clearly visible from the road...day and night, not blocked by decorations or snow. Apartment numbers should not be blocked by decorations and should be marked clearly on individual doors
- Please keep sidewalks and driveways shoveled to make access in and out of your home as safe as possible
- Please keep hallways, stairs and doorways clear of clutter to allow safe and easy accessibility into and out of your home
