## WELCOME WERNER ELECTRIC!

Grand Chute officials are pleased to announce that Werner Electric Supply has purchased land in our community and construction has begun on the company's new corporate headquarters building and regional distribution center. The project site is at the corner of West Prospect Avenue and South Casaloma Drive. The new building will house approximately 200 employees that work at the current headquarters/distribution center in Neenah. The site is large enough to accommodate Werner's future growth and expansion plans. The company plans to open the new state-of-the-art facility in early 2016.

The Town has partnered with Werner in preparing the site for development, extending streets and utilities, and completing some previously planned road upgrades in the immediate area.

This collaboration was made possible through the use of tax increment financing. Grand Chute became one of Wisconsin's first townships to create a tax increment district under a new state law adopted earlier in 2014. Tax increment financing allows a community to make infrastructure and property investments that support job creation and tax base growth. The community's investment is repaid from the increased property tax revenue generated by private development that occurs in the tax increment district. Providing greater employment opportunities and expanding the local tax base helps relieve the tax burden of residents and homeowners. The area that is included in Grand Chute's first tax increment district is expected to generate nearly \$30 million of new tax base over the next several years.

## BRUSH CHIPPING SERVICE CHANGES IN 2015

Chipping volumes have been on the rise in the town. From April to October, chipping crews are out two to three days a week to clean up the brush. The increase in time allocated to chipping has prevented Public Works staff from performing required maintenance of roadways and the utility infrastructure. Based on the need for this work to be done, the Public Works Department will be reducing brush chipping service for 2015.

The Town will offer brush chipping only in the months of May, June, September, and October. The chipping volume of 480 cf will remain the same and the scheduled pick up

### EMERALD ASH BORER BEETLE

The Emerald Ash Borer is an exotic beetle discovered near Detroit, MI in the summer of 2002. Since its discovery, it has spread to twelve other states and Canada. The beetle has been found in Minneapolis, St. Paul, Vernon County which is south of LaCrosse and most recently Appleton.



The adult beetle causes little damage aside from minor leaf feeding. It is the immature stage (larva) that does the real damage. Larvae feed on the inner bark of the Ash trees preventing water and nutrients to move through the tree resulting in its death. It is believed that the insect arrived on solid wood packing material originating in its native Asia.

The continued movement of the Ash Borer Beetle along with a high price tag to deal with the beetle are reasons why communities should prepare for the destructive invasive insect. Local DNR Urban Forestry

director, Richard Rideout said, “this is not a problem that belongs to any single agency or location.”

Grand Chute is currently developing an Ash Bore Beetle policy to implement and deal with the inventory of ash trees in the Town. Recently, our Park Foreman was certified with the State of Wisconsin in pesticide application to start treating Town-owned trees.

The Town of Grand Chute proposed objectives are as follows:

1. Protect ash trees from infestation for long-term survival;
2. Reduce the number of infested ash trees in an infested area and to minimize the immediate impact of a larger EAB infestation;
3. Remove trees that will cause safety issues;
4. Replace Town trees on a ratio of 1:1 of varied species.

## PRAIRIE HILL PARK MOUNTAIN BIKE TRAIL

The Grand Chute Park Commission will begin construction of a single track mountain bike trail along the US41 berm in Prairie Hill Park. The majority of the work will be by volunteers from the Fox Valley Mountain Bikers Club (FVMTB). Grand Chute Public Works and Park Departments will assist with maintenance, excavations and installations of technical features. A preliminary trail layout was marked last fall and cleared of vegetation.



The Town Board has approved developing a grading and drainage plan for the north end of the park and to extend the berm about 500 feet to Capitol Drive. Construction of the start corral, trail, and installation of technical features will continue throughout the summer. ## BIKE LANE SAFETY FOR CYCLISTS AND MOTORISTS

Now is a good time to refresh bicycle traffic tips, summer driving skills, and safety. Newly designed trails throughout the Fox Valley provide greater opportunities for off-road bicycling outings, but cyclists and motorists must remember to safely share the roadways with each other. Roadway bicycle lanes have been created to provide a safe route of travel for the cyclist; however, there are rules of safety to follow:

- Ride at least three feet from the curb or parked vehicles and in a straight line. Do not swerve in and around parked vehicles.
- Always ride in the same direction as traffic.
- Obey all traffic laws.



- Be predictable. Let other traffic know where you intend to go and maintain that course.
- Wear reflective items during hours of darkness and have a working headlight and taillight.
- Wear a bicycle helmet to reduce the chance of a head injury in the event of a fall.
- Be aware of changing road surfaces.

Motorists also need to refresh summer driving skills and safety laws.

Roadways are shared with motorcycles, mopeds, pedestrians and bicyclists. A few safety reminders to follow:

- Bicyclists belong on the road.
- Cyclists need room to get around potholes, sewer grates, and other obstructions.
- Leave at least three feet when passing a bicyclist, and more room at higher speeds.
- Do not drive in bicycle lanes.
- Train yourself to scan for fast moving bicycles in the opposing lane when you're turning left.
- Scan sidewalks and crosswalks before proceeding from a stop sign or completing turns.

## MOPEDS—LAWS AND SAFETY



As the weather continues to warm, we can expect more mopeds to return as travel options for many. Moped and motorcycle laws are similar, but there are some differences. If you are a moped rider, you need to be aware of these differences.

A moped is defined as a Type 1 motorcycle that is incapable of speeds faster than 30 miles per hour. It is equipped with an automatic transmission, an engine certified by the manufacturer at not more than 50 cubic centimeters, and a seat for the operator. Requirements for moped operation on a roadway are:

- Operators must have a valid driver's license. An instruction permit is not sufficient. You do not need a motorcycle license endorsement.
- Mopeds must be licensed, registered and insured.
- Mopeds are subject to all traffic laws.
- On roadways with two or more lanes in each direction,

mopeds must operate in the right lane except when turning left.

- Mopeds are entitled to a full traffic lane, but may not impede traffic.
- Mopeds may park in spaces designated for other motor vehicles, in bicycle racks or on sidewalks, unless otherwise prohibited.
- Mopeds are designed for one person, and it is illegal to carry a passenger.
- Moped operators do not need to wear a helmet, but it is recommended.
- Moped operators are required to wear eye protection.
- Moped operators are required to use a headlight during hours of darkness.

Motorized scooters, low-speed electric bicycles, and play vehicles have different definitions than a moped. They do not meet federal safety equipment standards for motor vehicles and are not designed for operation on roadways. ## WISCONSIN'S "MOVE OVER LAW"

**Y**ou're traveling on a highway when you notice you are approaching a vehicle with flashing lights parked on the side of the road. What do you do?

In 2001, to help safeguard law enforcement officers, emergency responders, road maintenance workers, and others who work on the side of highways, Wisconsin adopted a "Move Over Law." The law requires drivers to shift lanes or slow down in order to provide a "safety zone" for a squad car, ambulance, fire truck, tow truck, utility vehicle, or highway maintenance vehicle that is stopped on the side of the road with its warning lights flashing. Each year, many of these hard working people are injured or killed by passing motorists while conducting business on Wisconsin's roadways.

Motorists must do their part to reduce these incidents.

Drivers have two options for creating a safety zone:


- ◆ If the road has more than one directional lane, like Hwy 41, and you can switch lanes safely, you must move over to vacate the lane closest to the law enforcement officer or other vehicle with its lights flashing. If you are unable to move over due to other traffic, you must slow down and maintain a safe speed.
- ◆ If the road has a single directional lane, like CTH JJ, or you cannot move over safely, you must slow down and maintain a safe speed

for traffic conditions until you are completely past the stopped vehicles.

Not moving over can be costly. If you are stopped and receive a traffic citation, you will be assessed three demerit points on your driver's license and at least a \$145.50 fine. In addition, your driver's license will be suspended if you are involved in a crash and you may have to serve up to seven years in prison if you hurt or kill someone.

One of the Wisconsin Department of Transportation 2015 goals is to reduce traffic related deaths on our roadways. We can all contribute to achieving this goal by complying with the "Move Over Law."

## GRAND CHUTE POLICE RECEIVE PROPHOENIX AWARD



**I**n February, the Grand Chute Police Department received the 2014 ProPhoenix Significant Program of the Year Award for the Community Hotel Interdiction Program (CHIP). Grand Chute's CHIP program was selected, in part, because it addressed issues on various levels.

Specifically, it helped identify policing strategies, safety concerns for guests, and private business sector management practices impacting the quality of life for guests and the community.

The Police Department developed the Community Hotel Interdiction Program to address criminal activity and excessive calls for service at local hotels and motels. The program included developing a partnership with hotel and motel managers and the creation of an ordinance addressing accountability for excessive calls for service. Since the program began, the department has experienced a 20% reduction in calls for service at these establishments.



**FIRE STATION #2 CONSTRUCTION**

**UNDERSTANDING FIRE CODES**

**W**ork is progressing as planned at the site of the new Fire Station #2 at Spencer Street and Glenridge Court. The projected completion date is the end of June. This new facility will serve as a replacement for the 40 year-old fire station located on Highview Drive, whose maintenance requirements and infrastructure were determined to be insufficient to meet the needs of the community moving forward. The new station will improve response times into the mall district which accounted for over 40 percent of our emergency service requests in 2014, while also providing a more efficient workspace for firefighters. Since the groundbreaking in September 2014, construction crews have been busy transforming the vacant lot into the site for the new station, which will serve the residents and visitors of Grand Chute for years to come. The current staffing and apparatus at the Highview Drive Station, with a

a crew of 4 firefighters and a front-line and reserve engine company will be housed in these quarters 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. We thank you for your support of this project which allows us to serve our community more efficiently and effectively.



**I**n an effort to enhance communication with business owners, managers, builders, and contractors within our community, the Fire Prevention Division has published two documents which answer many of the “frequently asked questions” associated with fire code requirements. The Routine Fire Inspection Pamphlet explains common code violations while offering suggestions to ensure that safety is maintained. ## SAFETY DAY— Save the Date!

On September 5, 2015, the Grand Chute Fire Department will host the 6th Annual Family Safety Day at Fire Station #1 on Grand Chute Boulevard from 10am-2pm. This gathering, which aims to educate the public on a broad scope of safety-related topics is held in honor of Fire Prevention Specialist Jesse Pickett, who tragically lost his life in a car accident in December of 2013. It serves to memorialize his diligent efforts to reduce the loss of life from fires in our community. We invite you all to join us as we showcase the numerous services and agencies, which partner to provide for the safety and health of those within our community!



## EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE UPGRADE

It has become commonplace to see both fire trucks and ambulances on the scene of medical emergencies in the Valley, and all over the country. Since 1998, your Grand Chute Firefighters have been answering these calls in the capacity of emergency medical first responders, and in 2014, EMS incidents accounted for 1,267 of our 1,835 total requests for service. Our strategically-located fire stations allow us to respond and arrive quickly on the scene of these medical emergencies and initiate life-saving care when every second counts. Seeking to provide even higher levels of service to the community, the Grand Chute Fire Department took on the task of upgrading the caliber of emergency medical services it delivers. Throughout this process, which took place during 2014, fire personnel completed hundreds of additional hours of training to gain the knowledge

and skills necessary to provide service at the Emergency Medical Technician Level prior to the arrival of an ambulance.

In addition to first responder skills that firefighters were already using, such as oxygen administration and Automated External Defibrillation for cardiac arrest patients, Grand Chute Fire Personnel can now provide advanced level medical interventions. These include breathing treatments for patients with asthma or other respiratory problems, epinephrine injections to someone experiencing a severe allergic reaction known as anaphylaxis, and administration of glucagon to patients suffering from life threatening diabetic emergencies. This represents just some of the skills that have improved the level of service you receive from your Grand Chute Firefighters in your greatest time of need.

## RECREATIONAL FIRES

As we welcome warmer temperatures and sunny days, the aroma of backyard barbeques will fill the air and gatherings around outdoor fireplaces will bring us comfort on mild summer nights. Accordingly, those wishing to enjoy recreational fires must complete an application and obtain a permit from one of the two Fire Stations in Grand Chute. This process takes about five minutes, is cost free, and most importantly gives us the opportunity to discuss the regulations and safety precautions. While not all inclusive, here are a few items to adhere to when enjoying recreational fires:

- ◆ Refrain from burning when the winds exceed ten miles per hour.
- ◆ Do not leave fires unattended, ensure a competent adult is supervising.
- ◆ Keep a fire extinguisher, hose, or other water source nearby for extinguishment
- ◆ Ensure 15 feet of clearance is maintained between your fire and any buildings or combustibles.
- ◆ Contain fires in a three-foot diameter or three-by-three foot area.
- ◆ Do not allow flames to exceed two feet in height.
- ◆ Burn only clean dry wood - no leaves, yard waste, or brush.



As a reminder, we ask that you be mindful of weather changes and wind direction affecting smoke movement, which could impact your neighbors. We thank you for your cooperation as you safely enjoy this seasonal treat!
