NEW FIRE STATION #2 DEDICATED

Following more than twelve months of planning and construction, the Grand Chute Fire Department held a dedication ceremony on the afternoon of July 21st to commemorate the opening of the new Fire Station #2 located at 3900 West Spencer Street. Those in attendance welcomed the opportunity to tour the building, while getting to know the firefighters who will serve from the new location.



The facility was constructed following the completion of a comprehensive study determining that fire and emergency services could be delivered more effectively and efficiently from the Spencer Street location. The building replaced an existing forty year-old fire station which previously served as the municipal court and police station, and had become plagued with increasing maintenance costs. The new 10,500 square foot facility, which was completed within schedule and budget parameters, boasts energy efficient features including in-floor heating, high efficiency boilers, exterior LED lighting, and bi-fold bay doors.



This relocation of resources will dramatically decrease response times into the mall district which accounted for more than forty percent of the total calls for service in 2014, with residential subdivisions located in the southern portion of the response area benefitting as well. The personnel and apparatus configuration will remain unchanged from the previous location, with the station housing a front-line and reserve engine company staffed by a crew of three to four firefighters 24-hours a day.

DOG LICENSES

All 2015 dog licenses expire on December 31, 2015. Dog license tags for 2016 will be available the second week of December at the Town Hall. The dog license application can be found on the Town website in the Finance Department.

You may apply for a dog license either by mail or at the administration window in the Town Hall. The licensing year is January 1st - December 31st. The license fee is \$11.00 unless neutered or spayed, then the fee is \$6.00.

In Office: Bring payment, current rabies vaccination certificate and proof of sterilization (spayed or neutered) to the administration window.

By Mail: Complete the dog license application and send with the rabies vaccination certificate, proof of sterilization (spayed or neutered), check or money order made out to the Town of Grand Chute along with a self-addressed, stamped envelope and we will return the license and documentation to you.

TAX BILLS

December is approaching quickly and with that comes tax bills. Outagamie County mails Grand Chute's tax bills before the 3rd Monday in December. Locations accepting tax payments will be listed on the stub of the tax bill as well as on the Town's website and posted at the Town Hall, Fire Station #1 and Woodman's.

2015 CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

2015 has provided another busy construction season in Grand Chute! Through July, both the number of permits issued and total value of all construction projects was ahead of 2014 totals. The greatest area of increase has been in the new commercial category, due in large part to large projects for Werner Electric Supply Company and Costco Wholesale. There were 46 new home permits issued through July, putting Grand Chute on pace for a third consecutive year with over 60 housing starts. New subdivision openings near Town Hall in the White Hawk Meadows and Forest View Estates neighborhoods are providing a needed supply of lots for new home construction.



SCHOOL BUS SAFETY

Another school year is quickly approaching and with the start of school comes school buses and heavier traffic. We wanted to be sure everyone is aware of the laws with stopping for school buses and everyone is safe. Follow the safety information below: Did you know?

- * Operators of vehicles should stop at least 20 feet from a school bus while it is stopped letting children on/off the bus (red flashing lights and stop sign out).
- * The stop arm on the school bus is an added communication to other motorists, but does not need to be out while the school bus is stopped with flashing red lights on.
- * A school bus stopped with only yellow lights on means you can proceed with caution.
- * A school bus stopped with flashing red



lights on means you need to stop, if on a 2-lane highway or a 4-lane highway that is not a divided highway. Do not proceed until the red lights are turned off, the stop sign is withdrawn, and the school bus begins to move again.

- * Operators of vehicles driving in the opposite direction of a school bus stopped with flashing red lights on a divided highway do not need to stop.
- * Law enforcement officers do not need to witness the school bus violation in

order to take enforcement action, if the bus driver reports it within 24 hours.

This is a diagram of what operators of vehicles should be doing on the roadway while a school bus is stopped with flashing red lights on and stop sign out:

We hope this diagram enhances operator's preparedness and everyone will now know what to do when approaching a bus with flashing red lights. Remember, the risk of a pedestrian vs. vehicle accident jumps dramatically when school buses are stopped and children are getting on/off the school bus. Taking an extra few seconds to make sure a child isn't going to dart in front of your vehicle is an extra few seconds worth waiting.

BLACK FRIDAY/HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS

During the holiday season, crime rates tend to have a slight up-swing. This is due, in part, to shoppers carrying more cash and credit cards while shopping, shopping later than usual, and the relaxed, easy-going attitude that comes with this time of year. We call it good cheer; criminals call it complacency. By remaining aware of holiday season risks, you can better protect yourself. The Grand Chute Police Department provides these tips to assist you in having a safe and enjoyable holiday season.

Out and About

- Shop during daylight hours when possible and shop with a friend; safety in numbers.
- Be aware of your surroundings. Pay attention to who is around you and where you park. Be aware of someone watching you or following you.
- Pick your parking spot wisely. Look for a well-lit area and avoid large obstructions like dumpsters, large shrubs, etc.
- Lock your vehicle while shopping. Do not leave packages or valuables on the seat of your car. This creates a temptation for thieves. If you must leave something in your car, lock it in the trunk or put it out of sight.
- Do not leave your vehicle unattended while the engine is running, even if you are only going to be away from it for mere seconds.
- Have your keys out and ready when approaching your vehicle.
- Be aware of how you carry your purse or wallet. Would it be easy for someone to take it? Remove any unnecessary items and leave them at home.
- Try to carry only the amount of cash you will need to make your

purchases and limit the number of credit cards to only the ones necessary for your own current shopping trip or for that day.

- Keep a list of all credit cards, along with contact phone numbers for each card and keep it in a safe place. This will help in the event they are lost or stolen.
- Discuss various situations with your children. What will they do if you are separated? What will they do if approached by a stranger? What will you do?
- Practice an exercise used often by police and military called Crisis Rehearsal. Consider what you would do in various stressful situations. Go through the plan in your mind. If you practice this and then are faced with an unusual situation, you will be able to think more clearly and react more calmly because you have already rehearsed it.

- Map it Out... Create a plan for the day. This will help to alleviate any potential stressors encountered throughout your shopping day.
- Practice Patience...Expect long lines. Remember safety comes first. Enter the store safely, do not rush!! Always be considerate of other shoppers.

- Protect Yourself...Women should carry their purses close to their body and men should keep their wallets in their front pocket or in a coat pocket to deter pickpockets. Never leave your purse unattended in a shopping cart.
- Dress for Success...Dress casually, comfortably in layers, and expect cold weather. Stay hydrated and well nourished. Also consider leaving small children at home with a trusted family member or babysitter.
- Many Black Friday sales start on Thanksgiving Day. Plan your route of travel and be aware of “peak” shopping times at the mall or surrounding shopping centers.
- Obey the Laws...Drive the speed limit, stop at stops signs and pedestrian crossings. Don’t park in handicap stalls. Be aware of the road conditions and daily weather forecast. Buckle up for safety!!
 - Plan your Route...Be familiar with the roads around the Fox River Mall. Typically College Avenue and Wisconsin Avenue are the main thoroughfares to the mall and can become very congested during the holidays. Be patient and give yourself plenty of time to travel to and from the mall area.

Much of the above information is geared toward being aware of where you are, who is around and what is in the environment. If you can control the environment you enter into and pay attention to the things going on around you, you can greatly reduce the possibility of becoming a victim. A Safe Holiday starts with a Crime Prevention Plan!

NEW TAGGING OF CAR-KILLED DEER PROCEDURES

The recently enacted state budget contains several provisions related to Car-Killed Deer procedures that will generally eliminate local law enforcement's role in deer carcass tagging.

Wis. Stat. §29.349 now allows for possession and removal of a deer carcass from the scene of an accident once an individual notifies DNR by calling **608-267-7691** and provides their name, address, phone number, and the carcass location. **This notification must be completed BEFORE taking possession or removing the carcass from the scene.** Car-killed deer are no longer required to be tagged by a law enforcement officer.



Two items that have **not changed**:

1. Car-killed bear and turkey must still be tagged by a law enforcement officer, in accordance with prior procedures.
2. The operator of a motor vehicle that collides with and kills a bear, deer, or wild turkey has the first opportunity to take possession of the carcass (in compliance with the notification requirements [deer] or tagging requirements [bear/turkey] above). If the "striking operator" does not want to take the carcass, any other person who is present at the scene of the accident, or any other person who arrives at the scene after the collision has occurred, may take possession of the carcass (in compliance with the notification requirements [deer] or tagging requirements [bear/turkey] above).

WINTER NOTATIONS FROM YOUR POLICE DEPARTMENT

As winter approaches, we would like to remind you of three Grand Chute town ordinances that address winter parking and snow removal.

Town Ordinance 515-4 C. All-Night Parking Regulated, “When signs have been erected at or reasonably near the corporate limits of the Town, no person shall park any motor vehicle on any street or road in the Town of Grand Chute for a period longer than 30 minutes between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. from November 1 of each year to April 1 of the following year.”

The fine for violating the winter regulatory 2-6 parking ordinance is \$20. The police department understands when a personal conflict may prevent the removal of a vehicle parked on the street overnight. In the event such a circumstance occurs, please call the police department at (920) 832-1575 to make a request for overnight parking on town streets. We will try to honor your request; however, the daily weather forecast will be the main factor in the decision to grant or deny permission. If you call the police department after normal business hours, your call will be answered by the Outagamie County Dispatch Center. When you call, please state the reason for your call and request to speak to a Grand Chute officer. Outagamie County dispatchers are not authorized to grant overnight parking in the Town of Grand Chute.

Town Ordinance 398-5 Depositing Of Snow On Public Right-Of-Ways, “No person shall remove or cause to be removed any snow or ice from a premises owned or occupied by that person or from any residence, parking lot, parking area, filling station, business property or other property owned or occupied by said person by placing said snow onto any public right-of-way or property. Snow removed from public walks shall not be stored in any manner which will obstruct or limit vehicular or pedestrian vision, movement, or access.”



This ordinance makes it illegal to push snow into or across the street when shoveling, blowing, or plowing out your driveway and sidewalks. It also restricts snow stored or piled in a way which obstructs or limits the vision of vehicular or pedestrian traffic. Any violation of this ordinance would be considered a nuisance. In addition to a \$124 - \$313 fine (fines increase when prior offenses exist), the Town of Grand Chute may summarily remove any snow or ice so deposited, and cause the cost of the said removal to be charged to the property owner from which the said snow or ice has been removed.

Town Ordinance 515-4 D. Snow Emergencies, “Declaration of Emergency.” A snow emergency is in existence when the Chairperson or his designee declares an emergency to exist in the Town of Grand Chute by reason of an emergency snowstorm. Said

emergency is declared to continue for a period of 48 hours after declaration or until such earlier time as snowplowing operations have been declared completed by the Director of Public Works.”

The Chairperson or his designee may declare a snow emergency through the press, radio, or other public means of communication. When a snow emergency has been declared, no person shall park any vehicle on any street, alley, or public parking lot during the period of a snow emergency, or immediately thereafter, until such street, alley, or public parking lot has been cleared of snow. During declared snow emergencies, any vehicle which impedes expeditious snow removal efforts will be ticketed and towed at the owner’s expense.

Every year, the Grand Chute Street Department works hard to keep your town streets clear of snow and ice. Please do your part to follow the winter snow removal ordinances and remember to also keep fire hydrants clear from snow and ice.

Have a safe winter driving season.

DEER HUNTING IN THE TOWN

The 2015 Fall deer bow and gun seasons will be here before we know it, and this time of year always generates questions about hunting within the Town. These are some of the frequently asked questions:

Where can I hunt with my bow and arrow or crossbow in the Town?

The Town does have a hunting limits map available to view on its website, which is sectioned as Exhibit A and Exhibit B. This map defines areas where bows and crossbows can be discharged. Town Ordinance §415-3, Discharge of Firearms and Other Weapons, controlled where hunting could occur because it prohibited the discharge of a bow and arrow or crossbow, but Wisconsin Act 71 was enacted December 12, 2013, prohibits the Town from enforcing the ordinance. As a result, all areas of the Town are open to the discharge of a bow and arrow or crossbow; however, discharging these weapons for hunting will be governed by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) regulations and by obtaining property owner’s permission.

What rules do I have to follow in order to hunt on my property?

If you are hunting with a bow and arrow, crossbow, shotgun or muzzle loader in the Town, you must abide by all DNR hunting regulations, and more specifically, regulations pertaining to distances from roadways and occupied dwellings.

Can I hunt with a rifle or handgun in the Town?

No. The discharge of either weapon in the Town is prohibited.

Can I hunt with a shotgun or muzzle loader in the Town?

Yes. The Town hunting limits map identifies the section marked as “Exhibit B” as the area permitted to hunt with these firearms.

Do I need a permit from the Town to hunt?

No. If you hunt in the Town, you need a Wisconsin hunting license issued by the DNR.

Can I target practice with bow and arrow or crossbow on my property?

It is recommended that target practice occurs at an actual target range. The City of Appleton has a designated archery range in Memorial Park, the Village of Shiocton has an archery range and the Twin City Rod and Gun Club has an archery range. If you were to have a target set up on your property, you would have to have permission to shoot at the target from all residents and occupants of buildings within a 100-yard radius of your target.

Can I target practice in my yard with an air rifle such as a BB gun or pellet gun?

The same rules apply here as with the discharge of a bow and arrow or crossbow. You need permission from every resident within a 100-yard radius of your target.

It is recommended for anyone interested in hunting within the Town to consult the DNR’s website or printed publications for hunting regulations and the Town website to access the hunting limits map. Our officers can be contacted at 920-832-1575 for questions as well. Have a safe hunting season!

GRAND CHUTE FIREFIGHTERS ASSIST WITH SAFETY SEAT INSTALLATIONS

Outagamie County Public Health recently recognized the Grand Chute Fire Department as the inaugural recipient of the "Public Health Partner of the Year" Award. This honor was bestowed upon our organization and firefighters as a result of their collaboration with Safe Kids Wisconsin, facilitating the installation of over 150 safety seats in 2014, as well as sponsoring a recycling event for car seats which are no longer serviceable. Engineers Siegmann and Pavasaris, and Firefighters Lazcano and Jape each completed 24 hours of Child Passenger Safety Technician Training, enabling them to work alongside Public Health Department staff as we host monthly car seat fittings every third Thursday of the month at Station #1 (see details below for

information on scheduling an appointment). We are humbled to receive this recognition, and look forward to cultivating our relationship with these public health allies as we continue to partner on this, and other projects to enhance the safety and quality of life for those in our community. WINTER FIRE PREVENTION AND SAFETY TIPS

- Have your furnace, chimney, and vents inspected and serviced by a qualified professional at least once a year.
- Ensure your fireplace screen is constructed of metal, or heat-tempered glass in good condition and is secured in its position in front of the fireplace.
- Use a covered metal container to dispose of cooled ashes and keep it at least 10 feet away from your home or nearby buildings.
- Keep children at least three feet away from the fireplace, wood stove, or other heating devices.
- Only use space heaters with automatic shut-offs, and be certain that they are plugged directly into receptacles.
- Maintain a minimum of three feet of clearance around any heating device.
- Have working smoke alarms on every level, in each sleeping area, and outside each sleeping area of your home! Test them monthly!
- Have working carbon monoxide alarms on every level and outside each sleeping area of your home! Test them monthly!

NOTICE TO ALL PROPERTY OWNERS IN THE WATER SANITARY DISTRICT #1 TOWN OF GRAND CHUTE, OUTAGAMIE COUNTY

Starting Monday, September 14, 2015 between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., the Water Department crews will be flushing the main water distribution line through the fire hydrants. You may detect a little bit of discoloration and a small amount of mineral deposits in your water system. By using your cold water fixtures at more frequent intervals, this problem should be corrected sooner. Although the water may appear to have a somewhat bad characteristic, it is completely harmless. This program must be performed to supply you with better quality water. Thank you for your cooperation.

Free Tire Collection September 21st - 25th

Residential properties are allowed to place up to four (4) tires at the end of your driveway by 7 a.m. during this week. Tires must be 18" or less, rims are acceptable. You must call (920) 832-1581 or email us at publicworks@grandchute.net by **September 18th** to be placed on the list. We need your address, phone number, and the number of tires.

Utility Tax Roll Charges

All unpaid water, sewer and storm charges (for services provided prior to October 1, 2015) will be subject to a 10% penalty if payment is not received on or before November 1, 2015. All delinquent payments must be in our office on or before November 15, 2015 to eliminate tax roll placement. Notices to landlords, owners, and tenants will be mailed by October 15th.

PUBLIC WORKS UPDATES

The Town will offer brush chipping in the months of **September and October**. The chipping volume of 480 cf will remain the same and the scheduled pick up day which is always a Tuesday will remain the same based on your refuse collection.

- If Monday is your refuse collection then 1st Tuesday of the Month
- If Tuesday or Wednesday is your refuse collection then 2nd Tuesday of the Month
- If Thursday is your refuse collection then 3rd Tuesday of the Month
- If Friday is your refuse collection then 4th Tuesday of the Month

Residents are encouraged to use the Appleton Yard Waste Sites located at 701 S. Whitman Avenue and 2625 E. Glendale Avenue. Both sites accept grass clippings, brush, and yard waste. Snow Plowing

Town crews typically do most of the snow plowing during night hours, so please keep this in mind when placing your rubbish and recycling items out the night before pick-up.

Remember when plowing parking lots or long driveways that depositing snow on Town right-of-ways is prohibited. This blocks vision and can cause damage to Town equipment once the pile freezes.

Sidewalks and Snow

Per Town Ordinance, if your property is on a street that has sidewalks, you as the property owner, are responsible to clear that snow and/or ice within 24 hours from the time the snow ceases to accumulate on sidewalk. Please call 832-1581 with any questions.

Trail System

Snow and ice is not removed from trails within the Town. Trails are sometimes used for winter activities such as cross-country skiing and hiking. At times, the trails are confused with sidewalks. Typically, a trail is 10' wide and a sidewalk would be 5' wide.

Overflow Garbage Week is October 19 – 23

Place your extra garbage (that does not fit into your container) by the curb or roadside at least five feet away from any automated container, **on your garbage day by 6 a.m.** with your normal refuse. A separate truck will follow to pick up the overflow garbage during your garbage day or possibly the next day. Please note that overflow garbage does not include appliances, TV's, building material or any hazardous material. This is the final overflow garbage week of the year.
